PROPRIETIES AND ETHICS.

The following incident occurred to me recently at our club. I relate it as a "cautionary tale" - this has probably happened to you sometime or other. I was sitting North and the following bidding sequence occurred:

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 ${\tt E}$ then doubled the contract, and guess what? - ${\tt W}$ led a spade!

As readers no doubt realise it doesn't really matter whether E realised that the questions as such were not ethical or even if W had a natural spade lead - the point is that the questions were asked and W was left in very little doubt of what the lead should be. No attempt was made by E to read our system card which was on the table. As I was also the Director of the event I was in a rather awkward position - should I call a director and quote para 7.6 of our

Club's Tournament Regulations "... questions designed simply to alert a "sleeping partner will not be allowed" and para 7.8 "In framing questions special care must be exercised to avoid pointing to one particular bid which could induce a call or a lead based solely on the question"? If a player feels that questions need to be asked, then the onus is on that player to ensure that the question, is, in fact, genuine and not a partner waking/lead directing question. If you wish to ask questions and you are in any doubt as to the propriety of the question then the ethical thing to do is to ask your partner to leave the table before asking the question(s). This happened at Great Lakes Congress in the Teams where one of our opponents (Ross Folkard from Parramatta) felt that he needed more information when defending a contract at our table. He waited until his partner had led to the first trick and dummy had been laid on the table and then asked his partner to leave. He then obtained the information he required, his partner returned and play continued. As far as all players at the table were concerned this was a perfectly normal occurrence.

If the opposition start asking questions that you consider to be pointed then you should call the Director. In fact I let the matter go - which I should not have done. Believe me, the next time it happens I won't - but of course I shall have to wait until the end of the play of the hand if I am dummy!! CM.
