Director's Corner.

In common with the other affiliated clubs on the Central Coast the time given for each round in a pairs session is six minutes per board plus two minutes. Thus for a two board round fourteen minutes is allowed; a three board round twenty minutes etc. Players are expected to be able to play to these times. This can be a difficult for new players if a two board round is being played and they are generally given some leeway. However all players are asked to endeavour to keep an eye on the clock and play to the time allowed – this can generally be achieved by moving promptly to the next table, starting play as soon as arriving at the next table and endeavouring to keep discussion of the weather, the drought, the hands, who has done what with who etc until after all hands of the round have been played.


Colin's Corner

♦ 6

About halfway through the Friday duplicate a few weeks ago I picked up the following hand (dealt at the table):

and partner (of course) opened

♥ A8643 1 spade. Luckily my RHO doubled so I passed and LHO ♦ JT7542 bid 2 clubs. "Great" I thought **.** 7 "all I need now is a red suit bid from partner" and he duly bid 2 hearts. RHO bid 3 clubs and I, despite having eleven distributional points, was in chicken mode so bid 3 hearts. This bid was passed round to RHO who (thankfully) bid 4 clubs so I, now in competitive mode, bid 4 hearts and everybody passed. RHO led the club ace and a few moments later I was writing down plus 680 after partner had made the remaining twelve tricks. The full deal was:



I checked the scoresheet at the end of the session – 4H making twelve three times, 3H making twelve, 2H making twelve, 1S making eight, 1S making seven twice and 2C by East making seven. I'm glad that RHO doubled!


A few days later I picked up a similar hand:

♠ 82 and (the same) partner this
♥ QJ873 time opened 1 club. There
♠ KJT32 was no intervention by RHO
♠ 5 (although when I saw the full hand later I think that there should have been

hand later I think that there should have been) so I responded 1 heart and partner raised me to 2 hearts and everyone passed. LHO led the spade four and dummy appeared

♣ KJ73 I played the knave from dummy,
♣ A954 RHO played the ace and I played
♠ 876 the two. A spade was returned,
♣ A2 won in dummy with the king.

Deep thought then occurred before I played the heart ace followed by a small heart won by the king. LHO exited with a club and I eventually lost two diamonds thus making nine tricks. The full hand was:



My first mistake was passing partners two heart bid – I have eleven distribution points so should have bid three hearts (or perhaps three diamonds), giving partner the opportunity to bid four. In the play, after winning the spade ace, I should play the club ace, small club ruffing in hand and then lead the heart queen ducking in dummy if the king does not appear. Ten tricks can then be made. Despite this +140 was an above average score – the scores were 3H making four once, 2H/3H making three four times, 5C by EW one off, passed in once(!), 4H one off twice, 4H two off twice, 4C by EW making twice. Perhaps if RHO had overcalled two clubs we may have got to four hearts and played the hand better! © Colin Mitchell 2006.
