#### Director's Corner.

Once again the vexed question of mobile phones has to be brought up (and I know that I have on occasion been guilty). Please ensure that your mobile phone is turned off before the start of play (even if it has been left in your handbag / shopping bag in the corner of the room). Most of our players have heard the main theme from Beethoven's 5<sup>th</sup> Piano Concerto frequently enough to not want to hear it when they are halfway through a difficult hand. If you feel that it is essential that your phone remain on switch it to silent and vibrate and put it on your belt or in your pocket. If a call is received please wait until the end of the round before going outside and ringing back.

There have also been a few complaints about pairs continuing the post mortem well into the next hand (and, once again, I have been guilty of this on occasion). As soon as the cards have been taken out of the next board it is considered polite that all discussion of the hand just finished should cease. It is certainly considered impolite to take the discussion to the next table or continue it when new players arrive at your table. Law 90 warns strongly against such discussion because of the possibility of other players gaining unauthorized information.

This hand was dealt at the table on Wednesday 21 Feb – I was playing with Nancye Joss as our respective partners were slaving away over a hot bridge table on the Gold Coast. For once I was sitting North and opened 1 NT showing 15 – 18 HCP and possibly a five card major. Nancye thought for some time before bidding 2 NT (transfer to diamonds) with the South hand

and I dutifully bid 2 D. Nancye then bid 4 NT -Roman Key Card Blackwood and I bid 5 C showing 0 or 3 controls. It is technically possible that I can have no aces as even if I had opened with 18 HCP there could be 12 HCP outstanding. As we were committed to be at least in game Nancye decided that, with the void in clubs, it would be worth while asking for kings with 5 NT. When I replied 6 D showing one king I must have three aces so Nancye bid 7 D. As the cards lie it is difficult to not make the contract. We were somewhat surprised upon opening the score sheet to find that 6 NT had been bid once, 6 D had been bid twice and the remaining contracts were either 3 NT or 5D. Everybody made thirteen tricks.

Whilst playing (with no great distinction) in the Seniors Teams in Canberra the following hand occurred:

The bidding went pass – pass – pass and Wendy thought for some time before deciding that she should open one club. EW then bid diamonds; I showed my two major suits and eventually defended 4 D for +100. Needless to say our partners came back with -680 so we didn't do too well on that board! As the cards lie six spades is unbeatable - I couldn't find anyone that had bid six. If E starts off with one diamond I have no problem showing my major suits with a Michaels two diamond bid and we would probably get to four spades. I must have been feeling dull (it was towards the end of the last match of the day) as Wendy did bid spades and with nine HCP and a void I would normally bid to the four level. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*
