The club was well represented at Muswellbrook Congress on 7-8 October, which offered pairs and teams with a Final and Plate event in each. In the 10 x pairs final, Jaan Oitmaa and Sylvia Foster finished second; Wendy Mitchell and Margaret Regan finished third; Alan Bustany and Pauline Caust finished fourth. In the 16xpairs plate, Chris Hasemore and Barry Foster claimed second place. The Hume team (Peter and Elaine Hume, Barry Foster, and Chris Hasemore) finished first in the 5xteams final event. In the 6x teams plate, Wendy Mitchell, Margaret Regan, Alan Bustany and Pauline Caust claimed second place; David Bowerman, Dasha Brandt, Jaan Oitmaa and Sylvia Foster finished fourth.

At Pennant Hills teams on 15 October Helen Milward teamed up with Paul Weaver, Helen Lowry and Gary Barwick and finished sixth out of 22.

The Tomaree Congress was held on 28-29 October at the Horizons Golf Resort. Fifty-six pairs participated on Saturday. # John King

John passed away on October 24 at the age of 86. He joined our club in 2016, playing regularly with us and at his Home Club, Social Bridge - Ryde. Originally he travelled from Hornsby to Gosford to play, but in 2020 he moved here and travelled from Gosford instead. His deteriorating health caused him to return to Hornsby last year to be with family.

A Regional Master, John partnered Peter Mackey for about 6 months when Peter was a new player. Then John established a long partnership with Brian Warburton. As a pair they were well known for their enjoyment of the game, win or lose.

John had a major eye problem that made it hard for him to see the cards. He was a great one for bidding no trumps and played it very well. He was a phlegmatic no-nonsense player with a good card sense, who often called on his version of logic or 'gut feeling' to bid and play the cards.

Members recall John's tales of his days as a merchant seaman and of unloading timber in the Grafton area. He spoke fondly of his family. We remember John as a gentleman at the bridge table – our condolences to his family.

#### CAN THE SLAM BE BID?

In answer to Dorothy's question last month re how to bid the 7H slam, if the auction goes without interference:

2C! - 3C -4NT (RKC in clubs) -5D (0 or 3) -5H (CQ ask) - positive response (i.e. yes I have the CQ) 7C/7H (see below).



From East's perspective, all he cares is if partner has CQ or SKQ. West's positive response will definitely get him excited. When partner made things easy for you by bidding 3C showing a Club suit, a chance to ask! Roman Keycard on Clubs! East would not care how many keycards because he'll just ask anyway: do you have CQ? The bid to show CQ will depend on partnership agreement.

In Teams, the safer contract is probably 7C as there are entries to set up and enjoy hearts. In Duplicate, you can certainly try your luck of 7H (hoping partner has 2 or more hearts).

Note that even if 3C only showed 4-card club suit, still ask! All you're interested in (once partner showed length in clubs) is if he has CQ. In this scenario, you'll just hope your "trusty" 7-card heart suit will bring the 7H contract home.

By the way, I would not be bidding the South hand with merely 2D in Dorothy's suggested auction for playing Standard system. My partner passed as dealer, RHO opened 2C GF and I have a very decent diamond suit. I have 11 hcp and there's a GF hand on my right. Partner's pretty broke. I'm not going to let my opponents bid the hand easily.

Pre-empt! Yes I'm Vul against not, but with a 6-loser hand (or 5.5) all I need is 2-2-2 break in diamonds (or partner having either DQ or 3 diamonds) to have 0 losers in diamonds. 3D or 4D (odds look very reasonable even if played in 4DX) will be my choice. East is more likely to have SA for the GF bid as well.

If South did bid 3D, P - 2C! - 3D - P

P-X-P-4C

P - 4NT etc

# **MEMBERSHIP FEES FOR 2024**

#### STANDBY PLAYER

We are looking for a member who is willing to be our Standby player on **Fridays**. Your responsibilities would be:

- 1. Arrive no later than 12.00 pm
- 2. Assist the director with the session set-up as required and collect table monies
- 3. Be willing to play with anyone who arrives without a partner and ensure an enjoyable game. No teaching or criticism if you are the more experienced. If you are unable to play that person's system, there is a basic 'Improvers' system card that the player must play with you.

You are rewarded with \$15 and a free game if you are required to play.

#### ENJOYMENT AND CONSIDERATION FOR ALL

Soon you will see posters appearing on our walls with guidelines for behaviour etc during a game of bridge. It is easy to fall into bad habits so here are just a few reminders.

- Value your partner, be polite to all competitors and respect the director.
- Be tolerant of newer players, but DO NOT offer unsolicited advice. You may have the best of intentions but they are nervous and embarrassed enough. Further, it is important that you are familiar with what they have been taught and their level of competence.
- Call the director for any infraction. This should not be seen as an embarrassment, but a learning opportunity for all. Do not act as the referee yourself that is the Director's job.
- Discussion of bidding and play of a particular hand should not occur.
  IF there is time at the end of the round, QUIET discussion may be appropriate, but partnerships are best to do this at the end of the game.
  Certainly DO NOT continue these when you sit down for the next round.
- Greet your opponents on arrival and thank them when they leave.



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#### OPPORTUNITIES MISSED ...

It is not often one gets the opportunity to bid the Grand Slam of 7NT. Partners and I had the chance and the tools on 3 occasions within a week recently – and failed each time! All 3 hands involved a long club suit.

# 1. September 10, GNOT Regional Final, Board 19



W	E
2C*	2D <sup>2</sup>
2H*	2S*
3C*	

Playing Kokish 2's these 5 bids show 10+ Playing Tricks in clubs.

Next perhaps:

West 3C\*
3S natural

3D natural 4NT RKCB (1430) on spades


5C (1 or 4) ie SA, HA, CA, SK 6C (1)

5NT looking for the one missing K
7NT - counting 3x♠s, 2x♥s, 2x♠s and 6x♠s
= 13 tricks.

(Out of 8 pairs, 2 bid 6S making 13 and 1 bid 6NT making 13).

East

# 2. September 13, at the club, Board 16



West has a 9 playing tick hand – not quite a Game Force opening in my book.

If playing 2 over 1 GF the bidding might go:

West East

1D 2C\* Game Force 2H (= 4) 3C (= 6+, unbal-

anced)

3D (= 6) 3NT

West has 9 tricks and needs 3 from partner for a Small slam, 4 for the Grand. Now:

4NT 5C (1 Ace) 5NT 6H (2 Kings)

So that is 3 tricks, worth 10 HCPs, but East has at least 3 more HCPs for the GF bid, so 7NT!

(All 8 pairs were in NT, but only 3 bid 6NT, making 13)

# 3. September 15, at the club, Board 13

Again there were 8 pairs, with 6 managing to bid 6C, all making 13 tricks.

After North passes, East can count 9 playing tricks.

A possible bidding sequence using the 'Minorwood' convention to ask for keycards:



West East

1C

1D 3C (6+ suit, 16+ HCPs)

4C\* Minorwood 4H (3 or 0)

4S\* have you the Q? 5D (yes, with 1 extra King)

West can now count a sure 12 tricks - 2xSs, 2xHs, 2xDs and 6xCs. So 6C or 6NT look certain. 13 tricks are made in either because East's losing S and H can be discarded on West's DA and DK.

Minor suit slams are notoriously difficult to bid. There are many slam bidding methods available – try out yours on these hands!

The above shows the details of Monthly Shield competitions since 2012. This year Wednesday table numbers have been high (average 8.31) but no extra players were attracted on the Monthly Shield days (average tables 8).

There were 37 different players over the 10 months, but 53 different pair combinations – partners do have a habit of being sick, away or otherwise engaged! 21 players played with the same partner - 19 of these played the minimum of 4 times but one played 4 times with 1 partner and 4 times with another. Only 1 of these results can be counted.

Half of the eligible field receive outright awards, that is 9 pairs. The total MPs that will be issued is 10.08 in addition to points already earned in each session.

Note: If the condition had been 6 out of 10, the top placegetters would have been the same but only 5 pairs would receive outright awards and only 8.58 MPs would have been issued. Look out for these points next month.
