The last two months were filled with family festivities more than bridge competitions. I hope you all had a wonderful holiday!

There are only a few results to report for December. A few CCLCBC members played in the NSBC Festive Season On-Line Congress 16-17 December. Tony Burke and Mary & Steve Colling played in the Open Swiss Pairs and Tony Sappideen in the Restricted Swiss Pairs. Tony and Helen Milward were members of other teams and our RealBridge members Steve and Mary Colling played with Alan Bustany and Pauline Caust.

January saw a number of online events:

- NSBC Summer Online Teams (January 7) attracted Pauline and Alan
- NSBC Aust Day Weekend Online Pairs (Jan 18) Tony Burke, Helen Milward & Gary Barwick played in the Open and Margaret Regan and Pauline Caust came 8th out of 24 in the Restricted
- The NSWBA Summer Online Pairs League, directed by Alan Bustany, started on Jan22 and has been well supported by CCLCBC players. 5 pairs are playing in Division 1 (8 tables), 2 in Division 2 (2 tables), 3 pairs and 2 other members in Division 3 (8 tables) and one pair in Division 4. There have been 2 rounds to date, 6 more to go.

The highlight of the January calendar was the annual Canberra Summer Festival of Bridge, Jan 9-21. Several CCLCBC members competed in various events. Congratulations to all who played in this highly competitive congress!

Fourteen teams competed in the **National Women's Teams.** Di Coats, Jan Clarke, Sally Clarke and Chris Williams made it all the way to the semi-finals and finished 3rd overall. **Well done!**

Thirty-two pairs competed in the **Chris Diment Swiss Pairs**, and our own Chris Hannan and Chris Hasemore finished 23rd.

Three CCLCBC pairs competed in the **Fixed Income Solutions Swiss Pairs:** Chris Hasemore and Chris Hannan finished 48 out of 60, followed by Hope Tomlinson and Martin Johnson at 56, and Margaret Regan and David Snow at 57.

There were 142 pairs in the **TBIB Open Swiss Pairs:** Chris Hannan and Chris Hasemore finished at 121 and Hope Tomlinson and Martin Johnson at 140. Tony Burke, a Home club member who we never see, played in this event and also in the **SW Pacific Teams**.

Fifty-four pairs participated in the **500/750 Swiss Pairs.** Well done to David Snow and Margaret Regan who finished number 13; Pauline Caust and Alan Bustany finished at 41.

Twenty-two teams played in the **Under 750/300 Swiss Teams**, and the Bustany Team (Alan Bustany, Pauline Caust, John Knight and Shane Woodburn) finished 17th.

CANBERRA 2024

In the Women's Teams in Canberra this year, we, Jan Clarke, Di Coats, Sally Clarke and myself, were surprised to reach the top 4 teams in the semi-final. We were actually 5th of 14 teams, but 2 above us were non-contenders, so we were pretty chuffed to find ourselves playing against 3 of the best women's teams in Australia

However, that meant playing in a very security conscious set-up. We had to leave our phones, smart watches and any other possible communication devices in a box

We were seated in a row screened off from the adjacent row, our table had a screen diagonally across it and under the table was another screen so there could be no "footsies" with partner. The director explained the protocol for bidding and alerting, the latter being done silently on paper provided, and alerted on both sides of the screen.

There were other things, like who should move the bidding board under the screen and who should lift the flap in the screen when play began, and also how to notify when the bidding had ceased.

All this was pretty overwhelming for our team members, none of whom had done this before. Our days started at 9am and finished about 7pm – it was an exhausting but challenging experience.

BABES IN THE WOODS

Di Coats & Jan Clarke

So – maybe we are kidding ourselves. Chris, Sally, Jan and myself – we know we're not babes but are we really in the semi finals of the Women's Teams in Canberra? Both possibilities seemed equally unlikely but there we were!

We are to play 96 boards over 1 1/2 days (6 stanzas of 16 boards) against the same team, with short breaks between rounds. We are the only team in the semis who have not played behind screens before. If you wish to take a toilet break, you have to ask the Director's permission to avoid players meeting in the restrooms to discuss hands.

I (Di) sit North and Ella Jacob is East and we can see each other but we can't see Jan and Jenny Thompson, who sit South and West. There is no talking allowed except for the statement of "Contract" when bidding has ceased and "lead" once the opening lead has been made.

The bidding is made on a tray which starts on our side of the table for Board 1 as sitting North, I am the dealer. The tray contains the boards and has slots where we can place our bids using bidding boxes as normal. When I place my bid in the tray and it is alertable, I have to show the alert card to Ella and if she asks what it means, I have to write it down on paper. She then makes her bid and the tray is slid under the screen to the

other side of the table. Jan would then have to alert my bid and if Jenny asks what it means, she also writes it down on paper. If she then makes another alertable bid she has to alert that to Jenny in the same way. The pieces of paper are kept in case there are different explanations. The bidding continues until there are three passes and the last to pass says "Contract". Opening lead is placed on the table and the opener says "Lead" and West lifts up the flap so everyone can now see dummy and the cards being played.

Before each stanza of 16 boards, the teams take it in turns to choose the seating. As we had done well sitting as we were (Jan and I playing Ella and Jenny and Chris and Sally playing Jane Reynolds and Renee Cooper, we chose this seating each time but after 3 rounds, the Jacob team swapped it around.

The Jacob team had more experience in playing under these conditions and we have learnt from this. When we get there again (!!!!!!) we will take 'toilet breaks' to keep our blood moving and munchies to keep our blood sugar up!

The different environment and distractions, tiredness and exhaustion, led to a few silly mistakes on our part, particularly in the last stanza. Nonetheless, we were happy with our result, being in front all the way up until the last round. The team we played then went on to win the finals, beating the other team (Lusk) by more than they beat us so we held our heads high! (See Page 15 for some interesting hands bid and played)

President, Julie Sadler, had pleasure in presenting her partner, Anne Grayden, with her *Grand Master* certificate recently. Hope Tomlinson, who also was promoted to this rank in December, received her certificated at her Home Club, Brisbane Water BC.

The requirements of Grand Master are at least 1000 MPs, including 700 red/gold, of which 200 must be gold. Anne has been a member of the 1000 MP club since 2022, and had enough gold points, but needed more red/gold. Hope already had sufficient red/gold points, but needed more green. She will now also join the 1000 MP club.

DECEMBER PUZZLES

Dropped Card: Answers were received from Tanya Master, Tony Manea and Lisa McNamara. Well done to Lisa who wins a free game for the answer below, which covers all the necessary points:

Through elimination West would have supported East's spade bid if they had 4 spades, finding a fit. If they dropped the Jack they would have opened the bidding with 1NT as 16HCP. Therefore I came up with CK.

East, I believe if they had dropped the Queen hearts they would have bid them first in responding but they bid their 4xspades and if they had dropped the D8 I think they would pass as only have 4HCP, not enough to respond. Therefore came up with DK.

Play Puzzle

Both Kevin Hughes and Tony Manea submitted excellent answers. I am awarding the free game to Tony who mentioned the critical step of ruffing **high**. Well done! Here is his answer:

Two things need to happen

- 1. NS cannot lose the lead after they win the DK with the DA and
- 2. EW spades must break 4/3.

Play:

Nth wins DA, leads SA to create shortage in Sth hand;

Nth plays S3 trumping in Sth hand with HA;

H5 from dummy to Nth's H9;

Nth plays S4 trumping in Sth hand with HQ;

Now H6 which Nth takes with HJ;

Nth plays S5 and trumps with H7;

S plays H8 and N wins with HK*;

N plays S6 and S discards a diamond** loser.

NS now have only 3 losing tricks.

Editor's Note:

- * Opponent's trumps are now all drawn, even if they split 3-0
- ** Or a club loser on the established S6

ANNUAL ACCOLADES

McCutcheons

George McCutcheon migrated from Scotland to Australia in the 1950's. In subsequent years he exerted a profound influence on the organization of bridge in Queensland and Australia.

He organised Australia's first country congress at Toowoomba in 1960. Other congresses soon followed in Queensland and other parts of Australia, and this establishment of a congress circuit had a profound effect on bridge in this country.

Dr. McCutcheon's vision of the need to attract players from the rest of Australia and overseas resulted in the organization of the Gold Coast Congress which has grown into one of the nation's most popular events.

Dr. McCutcheon was responsible for the introduction of a masterpoint scheme in Queensland, and also played a significant role in the establishment of the national masterpoint arrangements. Fittingly, the ABF established in his honour the McCutcheon trophy, which recognises the players gaining the most masterpoints annually in all events contested in Australia.

The McCutcheon awards are presented to the player in each master ranking group (Gold and Silver Grand Masters are combined into a single category) winning the most masterpoints during the calendar year. Player ranking groups are determined by their master ranking at the start of the calendar year.

The ABF website lists the top 20 in each category. Congratulations to all 2023 placegetters.


