SEPTEMBER 2024 CONGRESS AND TOURNAMENT REPORT

It's been a busy month, and many of our members have been playing in events at home and away. Here's a summary:

Greg Quittner Swiss Pairs (1 Sep)

Only two of our members played in this event, and they finished well in the top half: Helen Milward and Gary Barwick finished 12th in the field of 30. Well done you two!

Tomaree Congress (7-8 Sep)

Out of the 50 pairs, Greg and Sharon Mayo claimed 1st place; Sylvia and Barry Foster finished 11th; and Dasha Brandt and David Bowerman finished 12th. Well done! For the teams competition, Greg and Sharon teamed up with Terry Bodycote and Paul Weaver and finished 6th out of 28 teams. Louise Lewis, Vic Pietraszkiewicz, Steph Mathews and Gary Heyting drove up for the day and finished 9th; Sylvia and Barry teamed up with Dasha and David and finished 18th.

CCLCBC Congress (14-15 Sep)

Our members turned up for this event in record numbers, which is fantastic! If you haven't already done so, you can check the NSWBA website for a complete report of all results.

Here are some highlights. For the Swiss Pairs, 56 pairs were divided into two sections of 14 tables each, based on total masterpoints per pair. In Division 1, first place went to Mark and Julie Guthrie of the North Shore Bridge Club; our own Helen Milward and Gary Barwick finished 2nd; and Helen Lowry (North Shore) and Jake Andrew (Sydney Bridge Centre) claimed 3rd. Congratulations to all!

Of the other competitors, eleven pairs included CCLCBC members, and three of our pairs finished in the top ten: Barbara Grant and Louis Koolen (8th), Eunice de Vries and Wendy Mitchell (9th), and Greg and Sharon Mayo (10th).

In Division 2, first place went to Maggie and David Havyatt from Illawarra; Sandy Boyd and Shannon Queree (Parramatta Bridge Club) claimed 2nd place; and Jodie Gudaitis and Lucy D'Ambrosio finished 3rd. Again, nearly half the field included CCLCBC member pairs, and two finished in the top 10: Kevin Hughes and John Aldersley finished 7th, and Wendy Byrne and Margo Burnet finished 10th.

Twenty-four teams played in one field on Sunday, nearly half of which included CCLCBC members. The Barwick team (Gary Barwick, Helen Milward, Helen Lowry and Jake Andrew) claimed first place; the Russell team (Judith Parsons, John Russell, Martin Brown and Michael Hogan) from the Sydney Bridge Centre finished 2nd; and the Mayo Team (Greg and Sharon Mayo with Michael Simes and Paul McGrath) finished 3rd.

Three of the top 10 teams included CCLCBC members: The Sadler team (Anne Grayden, Julie Sadler, Larry Bryant and Chris Williams) finished 5th; the Foster team (Sylvia Foster, Jaan Oitmaa, Jim Routledge, and Karen Ody) finished 8th; and the Regan team (Margaret Regan, Henrietta Hohnen, Wendy Mitchell and Eunice de Vries) finished 10th.

The best Restricted Team comprised our members: Peter & Alison Mackey, Trish Howard & George Connell. The best Novice team John & Bernadette Sandra, Kerry Robertson & Sue Ashley – all members of Brisbane Water Bridge Club.

GNOT National Qualifying (20-22 Sep)

This event was held on-line and included the 64 teams from around the country who prevailed in their club and regional qualifying rounds.

The 6-person Berzins team - Dorothy Berzins, Di Coats, Alfie Nation, Gwen White, Larry Bryant and Margo Brennan - qualified to represent the Central Coast in this national knockout tournament. While the Central

Coast team got knocked out in the first round, simply making it to this stage is a huge accomplishment. In the repechage, the Central Coast team finished a respectable 40th out of 54 with five wins and five losses amidst very stiff competition. A hearty congratulations to Dorothy, Di, Alfie, Gwen, Larry and Margo!

This year the Grand National Open Teams National Final (GNNF) will comprise two separate events: the GNOT National Final (GNOTF) – 4 teams – and the GNOT Non-Metropolitan Teams Final (GNOTNMF) – 8 teams (for which the Hunter1 team qualified). Both finals will be held at the Vaucluse Bowling Club on Saturday, November 23 and Sunday, November 24, 2024.

Sydney Bridge Centre Spring Congress Teams (28 Sep)

Frank and Paul Pellarini ventured to Sydney for this event. They teamed up with Hien Dang and Mandy Dodds and finished 12th out of 16.

Country Teams Zonal Finals (29 Sep)

In July we reported on the regional final of this event. The 13 teams who qualified at the regional level went on to play in the Central Coast/Hunter Zonal final, and four of those teams included players from our club. After 12 matches Greg and Sharon Mayo with Paul McGrath and Michael Simes finished 1st with eight wins, two draws and two losses. Chris Williams, Sally Clarke, Jan Clarke, and Di Coats finished 3rd; Hope Tomlinson, Barry Foster, Chris Hasemore, and Martin Johnson finished 5th, and Alan Bustany, Pauline Caust, Anne Grayden and Julie Sadler finished 10th. BRIDGE EDUCATION

- 1. **Beginners**: Eunice's new group (Tuesday evenings) started with more but now has 9 pupils.
- 2. **Improvers**: This course is for beginners who have now had some playing experience. It has been decided to offer this course (as happened last year) in two parts.

The first part will be held on **Wednesday Evenings** at 6.30 pm commencing October 30. The second part will be held in 2025, dates to be advised

The whole course consists of 7 lessons and will largely follow Derrick Browne's Improvers text, with some additional topics. The cost is \$80, including text, notes, hand records, exercises.

There are also 5 (optional) practice sessions at \$5 each which cover the concepts taught.

15 players from recent Beginner classes have been contacted and so far 10 have confirmed for Wednesdays. If you have not yet done so, please contact Wendy – 0423 388 529 or wmi20245@bigpond.com.

Any player who has previously completed the Improvers Course is welcome to repeat it all, or specific sessions only, at half cost.

The first part of the course is as follows:

October 30 No Trump bidding and play; Transfers to Majors

November 6 The Stayman Convention, responses & rebids; Finesses

November 13 Interposing – Overcall or Double; 3rd Hand Play

November 20 Mixed Practice + Rule of 20 November 27 Mixed Practice + Rule of 7

3. Workshops – Intermediate/Advanced

The first 2 Saturday workshops were attended by 10 and 12 players respectively.

The workshop on *Leads*, scheduled originally for October 5 will be post-poned because of the long weekend to October 19. The October 12 topic is 'Transfers to the minors'.

Wednesday workshops are due to start on October 9 with *Puppet Stayman*.

REMEMBER to place your name on the list at the club for all workshops. If there are less than 6 people interested the workshop will be cancelled.

MASTERPOINTS

September 30 is a very important date in the Masterpoint calendar. The number of green points issued by a club in the preceding 12 months determines how many red point (B4c) events a club can conduct in the next calendar year.

Pre-Covid our club ranged between 17 and 19 red point events per year. Subsequently we were allowed to offer 17 events (without issuing enough green points) but the formula was applied again this year when we were able to schedule 14.

It is pleasing to report that for 2025 we have earned 16 events, almost back to pre-Covid levels.

USE OF MyABF

1. REGISTERING

In last month's newsletter it was explained why we want our members to register. Of the 81 members not already registered, 17 have now done so, thank you. However, we need more of you to 'come on board'. Here is another way to access registration:

From our club Home Page, choose *Links* and then *Australian Bridge Federation*. At the far top right click on **MYABF** and follow the steps . .

2. REAL BRIDGE

Recently Alan Bustany emailed RealBridge players to explain that it is intended to use these sessions as a trial for charging from an individual's MyABF account rather than sending invoices once a month from the club

Pending approval from the Management Committee when it meets next week, this trial is now 'ready to go'. All September sessions will be 'back -charged' and then October sessions will be charged as they occur. If you have not yet set up credit in your MyABF account please do, so that we do not need to have separate invoicing as well!

DIRECTORS MEETING – Monday September 30

Concerns were raised regarding players pulling out bidding cards from the box and putting them back or just touching cards. The following regulation from BNSW applies:

" 6.1.6 Players should refrain from touching any bidding cards until they have determined their call. A call is considered to have been made when the bidding card is removed from the bidding box with apparent intent."

from Page 8 & 9.. LEADS - ANSWERS

- 2. ♣ 2 Dummy will usually be short in hearts, and you have possible heart tricks to protect. Even if the ♣Q would have been a trick, you'll break even by stopping some ruffs.
- 3. ♠ 8 The opponents have no extra high-card strength, and South's hearts won't come in. Play it passive. An aggressive diamond lead could give declarer his eighth trick.
- 4. ♦ 6 Your hand is too strong for a singleton lead. Anyway, with four trumps and prospects of a successful forcing defense, it's far from clear that you want to ruff.
