CANBERRA SUMMER FESTIVAL OF BRIDGE (7-19 Jan)

This was the big event in January. Lots of CCLCBC members ventured south to play in this great event. Here's how they went:

National Women's Teams. The Coats team (Di Coats, Jan Clarke, Sharon Mayo and Sally Clarke) finished 6th out of 10 with 4 wins, 1 draw, and 4 losses. The Lowry (Helen Lowry, Helen Milward, Jane Beeby and Liz Adams) team finished 10th with 2 wins and 7 losses.

Chris Diment Matchpoint Swiss Pairs. Chris Hasemore and Pete Lardy finished 28th out of 34, and Vic Pietraszkiewicz with Edward Czarnocki finished 31st.

Under 100 MP Swiss Pairs. Kevin Hughes with Carolynne Mucharsky finished 16th of 28.

Fixed Income Solutions Swiss Pairs. Chris Hasemore and Pete Lardy finished 40th in a field of 82.

The Bridge Shop Novice Teams. Well done to the Khong team, which included Kevin Hughes, Carolyn Mucharsky, Margaret Cusack and Rhonda Khong, who finished 2nd in the field of 8.

TBIB Open Swiss Pairs. Against stiff competition in a field of 146 pairs, Di Coat and Jan Clarke finished 112th.

TBIB 750/500 Swiss Pairs. Out of 46 pairs, Chris Hasemore and Pete Lardy finished 3rd, with 9 wins and 2 losses. Well done!

TBIB 300/100 Swiss Pairs. With 36 pairs competing, Vic Pietraszkiewicz with Edward Czarnocki finished well in the top half at 15th with 5 wins, 2 draws and 4 losses; Kevin Hughes with Tracey Dillon finished 21st with 6 wins and 5 losses.

There were other events in December and January:

NSBC Festive Season Online Congress. Way back in December 2024, our own Helen Milward (with Ella Jacob, Jane Beeby, and Helen Lowry) finished 8th of 16 in the teams event.

NSBC Online Summer Teams (5 Jan). Twenty-two teams competed, and Helen Milward with Les Grewcock and Mark and Julie Guthrie finished 20^{th} ..

NSBC Australia Day Weekend Online Swiss Pairs (26 Jan). Twenty-eight pairs played in this event; Helen Milward and Gary Barwick finished 19th and Steve and Mary Colling finished 25th.

GOLD COAST CONGRESS (1 - 8 February)

This is a fabulous well-organised congress with thousands of players from Australia and around the world. It has events for everyone from the rookie to the diamond grand master.

To make it more fun, the surrounds offer a fabulous variety of foods, drinks, accommodation, and entertainment. A number of our members competed and reportedly had a great time at and away from the bridge table. Here's how they went in the competitions:

Bobby Richman Pairs – Open: Helen Milward with Kuldip Bedi finished 58th of 118 pairs sitting N/S in the qualifying round; Sharon Mayo and Sally Clarke finished 61st in the E/W field in the qualifying round. Both pairs qualified for the E Final, where Clarke and Mayo finished 6th, and Milward and Bedi finished 26th out of 28 pairs.

Bobby Richman Pairs – Restricted. Kevin Hughes with Marcelle Goslin finished an impressive 13th E/W in the qualifying match, qualifying for the A final where they finished 27th out of 28. Jane Stephen and Colin Kleinig finished 20th out of 76 pairs in the qualifying round, making them eligible for the B final where they finished 27th of 28.

Bobby Richman Pairs – Novice: Tony Canavan played with his son Andrew, and they finished 29th of 44 in the qualifying round. In the C Final, they finished 11th out of 16.

Four events were held for the Reg and Joan Trophy:

Saturday Butler Swiss Pairs. Wendy Mitchell and Margaret Regan finished 117th of 122 in the Open field. In the Under 500 MP division, Steve and Mary Colling earned 13th place, Roy Cotton and Steve Calcroft came 46th out of 52 pairs.

Sunday Butler Swiss Pairs. Wendy Mitchell and Margaret Regan earned spot number 15 out of 144 pairs in the Open division; Di Coats and Jan Clark finished 46th In the Under 500 MP division, Steve Calcroft and Roy Cotton earned 7th place, and Mary and Steve Colling finished 21st out of 66 pairs.

Monday Butler Swiss Pairs: Di Coats and Jan Clarke finished 14th out of 120 pairs; Margaret Regan and Wendy Mitchell finished 69th; Steph Mathews and Gary Heyting did not finish last, coming in at 96th. In the under 500 MP division, Mary and Steve Colling finished 33rd, and Roy Cotton and Steve Calcroft finished 55th out of 64 pairs.

Friday Butler Swiss Pairs: A big congratulations to Jan Clarke and Di Coats who finished 1st of 42 pairs in this Open event! Mary and Steve Colling also competed, finishing 27th.

Open Teams Qualifying: This event included 156 teams with at least one member over 1500 MPs. The Sharon team (Ian Price, Sharon Mayo, Sally Clarke, and Bruce Tier) finished 44th; the Bedi team (Helen Milward, Elaine Ford, Carol DeLuca and Kuldip Bedi) finished 53rd; the Regan team (Margaret Regan, Wendy Mitchell, Dasha Brandt and David Bowerman) finished 83rd; the Bodycote team (Di Coats, Jan Clark, Terry Bodycote, and Paul Weaver) finished 87th.

Under 1500 MP Teams Qualifying: With 70 teams competing in this division, the Heyting team (Steph Mathews, Gary Heyting, Louise Lewis, and Vic Pietraszkiewicz) finished 40th; the Colling team (Steve and Mary Colling, Pauline Caust and John Evans) finished 47th.

Restricted Teams Qualifying: The Edwards team (Kevin Hughes, Marcelle Goslin, Peter Muller and Carol Edward) finished 75th out of 84.

Ivy Dahler Butler Swiss Pairs Open: In the E/W section Helen Milward and Kuldip Bedi finished 41st out of 119 pairs.

Ivy Dahler Butler Swiss Pairs Restricted: Kevin Hughes and Marcelle Goslin finished 23rd out of 72.

The Walk-ins: The Congress also hosted walk-in pairs every day, which were open to players of all levels.

Other players from Central Coast Clubs also competed in what was officially the last ever Gold Coast Congress. However, toward the end it was announced that there is a glimmer of hope of this event continuing.

OPENING LEADS AND BAD OPENING LEADS

The first Workshop for 2025 covered a lot of fundamentals of bidding, play and defense, to brush off some Christmas and New Year's rust.

One topic of discussion was opening leads, and we went through the main techniques that everyone knows. The best leads are leading partner's suit, or a sequence of three touching honours, and perhaps leading a singleton versus a suit contract. The other commonly taught leads are to lead from two touching honours against a suit contract (especially aceking and king-queen combinations), or fourth-highest from a suit where you have an honour.

During the workshop, there were several hands where the opening leader didn't have a nice lead, and had to weigh up several unattractive choices. One holding that we discussed was a suit headed by the ace, but with no king. In general, it is not a good lead. If you lead the ace, it establishes the king as a winner, and more often than not, the opponents have the king between them. Leading a low card in that suit is potentially even worse, since the opponent's might win their king, and subsequently be void in that suit, or discard their cards, and you might never get your ace.

This leads to a poorly understood phrase, "Don't lead away from an ace". That phrase should be expanded to include "... against a suit contract" since it is fine against notrumps, your ace can't be trumped later. The other reason that this is a poorly worded tip is that it is misinterpreted to mean lead the ace, not a low one. That is often a bad lead as well. It is generally good to lead a different suit. If you partner bids one suit and then leads another, you should try to work out why, but often lead back the suit they bid. They often have the ace but no king. Leading from a suit where you have the ace but no king risks giving away a trick to the opponents king.

For those with enough stamina, the Gold Coast Congress also offered presentations before play or at lunchtime on a number of topics.

Being never too old to learn. I attended a few: Will Jenner-O'Shea on the 'Scrambling 2NT'; Andy Hung on 'Stoppers: Showing, Asking, or Neither?'; Barry Rigal on 'When to Pre-empt and the Theory of Flaws'. While on the subject of leads, here is an extract from Gold Coast Bulletin 5, from an article by Barbara Travis which begins on Page 14.

Does your opposition always make one more trick than the rest of the field?

Understanding this example may prevent you from giving away that extra trick.

Board: 23, Dealer South, All Vul

West North East South

Pass 1NT Pass 3

You are sitting West, on lead, with:

↓J873♥63↓AQ10♣KJ62

I think this hand calls for a passive lead, i.e. a trump. You have a decent hand, but you are leading around to declarer – and you don't want to help them. Any heart honours are already onside, so just lead a heart and don't help declarer.

The full hand:

♠ K42 **9** 10 7 ♦ 198762 ♣ A 4 **♠**J873 ♠A95 ₩63 ♥J92 ♦543 ♦ A O 10 ♠ KJ62 ♠ 10 8 7 5 ♠ Q106 ♥AKQ854 ♦ K ♠ ○ 9 3

Look at the effect of leading a black suit... A club lead gives away a club trick and a club ruff. A spade lead provides declarer with two spade winners. East has to win the spade and shift to trumps to prevent declarer ruffing a club in dummy, after which declarer will come home on accurate card-reading. So think about the auction and whether you are leading through or around to the strength.
