#### FACTS AND FIGURES

The latest Newsletter from the ABF Masterpoint Centre provides these statistics of the number of bridge players:

National Club Membership Total=36,439 (corresponding total last year: 36,628)

By State: ACT=969; NSW=14,263; VIC=5807; QLD=7683; SA=2342; WA=4299; TAS=920; NT=156

Our club is one of the 152 in NSW and 31st in terms of number of Home members.

The Centre also produces several different reports on members' performance throughout the year which you can easily access through *Links* on our website.

#### 1. McCUTCHEON TROPHY

The McCutcheon Trophy is awarded to the player earning the most masterpoints each calendar year. This trophy is named after Dr George McCutcheon who migrated in the 1950's to Australia from Scotland.

Dr McCutcheon organised Australia's first country congress at Toowoomba in 1960 and it was his vision that resulted in the organization of the Gold Coast Congress. He was responsible for the introduction of a masterpoint scheme in Queensland, and also played a significant role in the establishment of the national masterpoint arrangements.

#### VALE: FELICITY OSBORNE-FIRTH

Felicity died after a short illness on November 19, 2019 at the age of 80. Felicity was a member of CCLCBC for about 16 years, up to 2010 and is fondly remembered by players from that time.

Felicity trained as a teacher in Sydney before moving to Armidale. She is listed as a classroom teacher at Armidale City Public School in 1969. In Armidale she added a Masters Degree from the University of New Eng-

land to her Bachelor of Arts. Her thesis was on feminism and its effect on University students and nurses. She also met and married John Burr (Head of Computer Science at UNE).

On her return to Sydney Felicity taught High School students and tutored at the University of Western Sydney.

Felicity was a very keen and competitive bridge player. She played at the (then) Lindfield club and at Trumps (where Wendy Mitchell knew her). She and her husband moved to the Central Coast in 1994. Nancye Joss had moved here at about the same time and they formed a regular partnership.



At their Wyoming home Felicity hosted large Bridge parties (5 or 6 tables) attended by (names from the past) Les Free, Jo Abbott, Pat Kirk, Des Withall, Fini Kuipers and me among many others! Typical of Felicity there would be champagne and delicious food. She continued to play at CCLCBC even when she was in a wheel chair. She was often helped into the club by George Boettiger when we used to play in the Macquarie Room. Later in the Indoor Bowls area, Felicity would arrive in a taxi and use a wheelchair provided by the Leagues Club.

Felicity was always interested in all branches of the Arts and taught Creative Writing at the Tuggerah Lakes Community College. She stopped playing bridge competitively around 2010, having reached \*\*National Master with 25.44 Gold, 125.06 Red and 157.47 Green masterpoints. In 2012 Felicity donated a number of bridge books to our 'Library'.

Although she could not get out as much, Felicity still hosted Sunday games with 4 people. This continued at Aurrum (briefly) and then at Woodport (where she was very happy) – still competitive and still with delicious afternoon teas.

#### HANDICAPPING IN BRIDGE

In bridge there are a number of ways of recognising the different standards of players:

#### 1. Master events

Players are divided into categories so that they only compete with others of similar standards. Our Graded Pairs Club Championship is an example, when there are enough tables to form two sections. Then pairs with at least one player of \*National or above status compete for Grade A in one section, while the others compete for Grade B in the other section.

#### 2. Stratified events

Players compete against pairs of all standards, but a pair can win within their own strata. The event has as many winners as there are strata.. Our Zelda Overhall Cup is conducted this way – players of all standards compete for the red points, but only a pair of ranking \*Regional and below can win the trophy.

The State UHMP event is an example of this type – participating pairs in four masterpoint divisions as well as non-contending pairs are mixed together in the club events.

#### 3. Handicapped events

When a handicap is applied in a competition it 'levels' the playing field so that players of all standards compete against each other as if they were of equal ability. Handicaps are applied in various ways in all sorts of sporting events – chess, bowling, swimming, horse racing, golf – to name a few.

Handicaps are allowed for in bridge competitions. There can be a winning pair based on handicap, for which prizes or trophies may be awarded, but masterpoints are only issued based on the non-handicapped positions. There are different methods of calculating a player's handicap but all take into account *past performance*.

Handicaps are used in England and New Zealand. In NSW there are some clubs using them, with different methods and in different ways.

Producing results based on handicap gives encouragement to players who would otherwise have little chance of a position in the top half of the field. Recognition can be given by the display of these results, small prizes, free games or even an annual trophy.

Your Committee is investigating the ways in which we may use and report on Handicaps in our club.

You may have already noticed the 1st and 2nd places based on handicap are on the printed results.

#### FROM THE DESK OF THE VICE PRESIDENT

#### A. Web site additions

- *Committee* Minutes: As requested at the AGM an edited copy of the minutes of the General Committee meeting is posted on the home page of the club web site after they have been approved at the following meeting i.e. the August minutes will be posted after the September meeting. Click on *Committee Meeting*.
- Facebook: there is also a link to the Club Facebook page currently at the bottom of the list of links.

#### **B.** Club Tournament Regulations

- *Current:* Click on "*Constitution, Bylaws, Regulations*" to get to the Club Tournament Regulations link. Note that Pairs that use "Brown Sticker" conventions are currently not allowed to use these against pairs that have Protected Status<sup>2</sup> [see para 5 Protected Pair Status].
- *To be Updated:* The committee has decided to add to the Club Tournament Regulations in order to allow pairs that do not have "Protected Pair" status to refer to a written defence to these bids during bidding and play.

The updated regulations will probably be in force by 1 March.

#### 1. These conventions include:

- opening bids from 2C to 3S which may be weak and do not promise 4+ cards in a known suit (a multi 2D is exempted)
- overcalls that do not promise at least 4 cards in the suit (NT overcalls exempted
- Any weak 2-suited bid at 2 or 3 level with less than 4 cards in 1 suit **Do you play a Brown Sticker convention? If in doubt, find out!**

#### 2. Entitlement to protection (in Green (E) events):

- If both players are Nil, Graduate, Club or Local OR one is a Nil Master and the other \*Local or above
- You place an Orange sticker on your system card

Claim the entitlement if eligible because Brown Sticker conventions place demands on your defensive preparations.
