CONGRESSES Best Local Players JOHN ARKINSTALL STATE OPEN TEAMS

Dec 11 & 12

Held on RealBridge this year, 10 Teams from the qualifying sessions representing the NSWBA, the Sydney Metropolitan zone, the Outer Metropolitan, Northern, Southern and Western zones, played in the Round Robin event. This included Outer Metropolitan 2 team consisting of Brisbane Water BC players David Bowerman, Chris Hasemore, Alfie Nation and Gwen White.

Winners of the final were Kim Morrison, Bruce Neill, Mike Hughes, David Weston & Julian Foster by a margin of just 2 Imps.

The Country Teams play-off was won by Outer Metropolitan 1 team consisting of Sharon & Greg Mayo, Paul McGrath & Michael Simes.

Concurrent with the finals on the Sunday, 26 pairs played in a Swiss Pairs event, also on RealBridge. Rakesh Kumar in the December edition of NSWBA eCongress Newsletter describes some hands from this event. Here are two of them which focus on defence.

1. With the opponents vulnerable and your side not vulnerable, LHO deals and opens 1NT. Partner overcalls 2NT showing the minors and the


opponents reach 4. Sitting South, you are (virtually) clutching your customary collection of riches and see this East dummy:

Partner leads the ♣ A, ♣ K and ♣ Q, as you signal a doubleton.

What are you going to play on the third club? Does it really matter?

2. Again with the opponents vulnerable and your side not vulnerable, you pass in first seat, as do LHO and partner. RHO opens 1♠ and is raised to 2♠ by LHO. RHO now jumps to game. Sitting North, you quite reasonably lead a diamond and see this East dummy:



Partner takes ◆A, declarer playing the queen, and returns ◆9 which declarer wins with the ace. Declarer cashes ◆K as you play ◆7 and partner plays ◆J. Next comes ♥Q, which you capture with ♥A. What now?

NEW TOURNAMENT REGULATION

Players have been quick to adapt to the new regulation:

When bidding boxes are in use, after the opening lead is faced players are to return the bidding cards to the boxes, with the exception of the final contract.

However there are a few points to reiterate -

- 1. A few people are missing the phrase *after the opening lead is faced*. Except for Pass cards, the whole of the bidding must remain visible until the lead is turned up (faced). **This is essential!**
- 2. Some have established the practice of placing just the one card on the bidding box to show the final contract. For example the 4♠ card, without the accompanying cards beneath it. While this may stop the cards from slipping, it is not recommended because of the chance of misplacement when returning it to the bidding box.


As described in the December Newsletter, simply collapse the bidding cards so that only the 4S is showing and place the whole group of cards on top of the 'board'.

3. Remember to do this without obscuring the Dealer and Vulnerability.

A GRAND SLAM

Monday Evening, December 27, had only 2 tables, but that didn't stop there being interesting hands! Here is one of them, as described by Anne Grayden, who played and made it with partner Julie Sadler.

Below was our bidding by E/W with N/S passing throughout.



East opens 1C, West responds 1H and East rebids 2NT - showing 18-19 HCP and a balanced hand.

West shows the second suit by bidding 3D. This promises at least 5 hearts & 4 diamonds.

So, East now knows there's a H fit & bids 4H.

West, now knowing partner has 3 hearts, has 15HCP + a void opposite 18 -19 HCP, is interested in slam and so bids 4NT (Keycard Blackwood) to ask about Aces and the King of hearts.

East answers 5D showing 0 or 3 key cards. West takes this to be 3 considering the points shown with the 2NT bid. Now with 2 key cards (D Ace & H King) as well as the H Queen, West considers: -

There are 6 or 7 HCP outside the 3 Aces in East's hand. Being optimistic West assumes 3 of these points is a King.

If it's the Spade King, then there are no losers in spades, as East has already shown the Ace & West has 3 to the Q.

If it's the Club King, then along with the Ace of Clubs which has also been shown, two of West's spade losers disappear.

So 7 Hearts is bid.

Editor's Note:

It is not generally recommended to ask for Aces when holding a void, but rather to bid controls.

A possible sequence would be:

	1C
1H	2NT
3D	3H
4C *	4S **

^{*} first round control – not encouraging to East opposite the CA

If control bidding is continued, EW may stop out of the Grand Slam. As it happens, 4NT finds that all 5 Key cards are held. If in any doubt, 5NT finds East with 1xKing, and as Anne explains, it does not matter whether it is the C or S King.

1. To save partner from a possible endplay situation and/or from committing a grave error, all you have to do is ruff ♣ Q and play a diamond through.

Of course, the contract will always go down if partner exits with a trump – but if partner leads a diamond away from • KJ declarer will make! Two did.

After the first 4 tricks, what do you know as North?

Firstly, partner doesn't have \bullet K.

Declarer played • Q on the first trick, but while this might be some ploy to gain an entry to dummy with the jack, it seems likely that declarer has a doubleton • KQ.

Secondly, declarer has 6 spades as two rounds of trumps sufficed.

That being so, declarer's remaining cards may be 3-2 or 2-3 in the round suits – there's not much to think about if s/he is 4-1 either way. If declarer has ♥Q J, either doubleton or with a third heart, then if partner has ♥A it is necessary to grab 2 club tricks now, else a loser or losers will be discarded on the heart suit.

So you have to play a small club to partner immediately!

MEMBERSHIP FOR 2022

Four people have indicated that they will not be renewing. 33 Home members and 26 Associate members have not yet renewed.
