

GOLD COAST CONGRESS

Feb 18 - 26

The Gold Coast Congress was first held in 1962 at the Chevron Hotel, Surfers Paradise, with about 60 participants. When the Chevron was redeveloped, play moved to the ANA Hotel and Gold Coast International Hotel. Numbers grew, with a large contingent of NZ players and other Internationals attracted to the high quality competition. From 2007 the Gold Coast Convention Centre has been the venue for this prestigious (now) gold point event.

In 2008 special events for Novices were introduced, followed by events for Intermediate players. This year a new category in the Teams Championship was introduced for teams under 1500 MPs, thus reducing the size of the Open field.

ABF President, Allison Stralow, wrote in the first Bulletin: I welcome players to Broadbeach for the 60th Gold Coast Congress. The diamond anniversary was due to be held in 2021 but was postponed because of Covid-19. It is now time to celebrate as diamond means unconquerable and enduring which is symbolic of the bridge community during these unprecedented times.

International travel restrictions and Covid-19 nervousness meant that numbers were well down with 462 pairs and 208 teams, compared to the previous 4-year average of 1032 pairs and 470 teams.

Participants from the Central Coast were also well down. CCLCBC members attending were Tony Burke, Di Coats & Jan Clarke, Garry & Sally Clarke, Gary Barwick & Helen Milward and Sharon & Greg Mayo.

In the Bobby Richman Pairs Championship Di and Jan qualified for Final B from a field of 54 tables, ending 17th out of 28 in this group. Out of 70 teams in the Open Teams Championship, Sally & Garry were 41st and Di & Jan 44th (both playing with pairs from other areas).

Because Presentation Day could not be held in 2021, winners of events held in both 2020 and 2021 will receive their trophies/prizes.


History:

This deal was from the final of a national Women's Team Selection Playoff:

At both tables in the Open Final, South was +650 in 4♠, no E-W bidding. Ditto at one table in the Women's final. At the remaining table, Barbara



Travis was West in 5♦ doubled after the auction given.

North led the ♠A and switched to the ♣10. Travis cleverly ducked in dummy! On the next club, king, ace, West ruffed. After ♠K, ♠A, she ditched three hearts on the clubs, one off, -100, +11 Imps. South could / should have taken the ♣A at trick 2 to shift to a heart, but North can make it easier by switching to a low club. Murphy's Basic Law for defenders: If you give partner a chance to do the wrong thing, partner will take that chance.

BEHIND THE SCENES - REAL BRIDGE

Hi all, Ronnie here. Some of you may be interested in how I direct online. In this first article of a two-part series, I'm going to show you some of the behind-the-screens that Alan Bustany and I use when we direct online on RealBridge. This is what a session page initially looks like:



Not much in here, but this is where we can add the session names (e.g. CCLCBC Tuesday Online Session) and banner (e.g. Thanks for supporting CCLCBC!) as you will no doubt have noticed. A keen-eyed reader may also notice there are a few more buttons on the top right corner than those you have on your screen.

Here is where all the magic happens. We can add or remove tables as fellow members like you arrive by clicking the "+" and "-" buttons respectively. We can also change the settings of the session depending on the event of the day.



On the next page there is a screenshot of the Session Settings.

Here we can choose the scoring: matchpoints, X-IMPs or Teams scoring. We can set up different movement types such as Howell, Mitchell, Swiss, head-to-head or Round Robin (if it's a Teams event). We can specify the VP scales as

required (ABF VP scales for Pairs are also available here even though Real-Bridge is based in the UK).

Finally, we can set up the time limit, the number of rounds and boards per rounds. Specific sets of boards can also be uploaded here. After all the preparation work is done, the session is ready and we'll click on the Open

session button so you will be able to join in.

RealBridge does not calculate masterpoints (not for the ABF ones anyway). At the end of the session, I download a RealBridge-generated file which contains all the board scores, names and your ABF numbers. It is then processed and imported into Compscore2, our club's scoring program (the one that drives Bridge-mates which we all rely on nowadays), so masterpoints can be issued and results can be uploaded to our club website.

Members who want to replay their boards, bid-by-bid, play-by-play, are now able to use the link with a suffix RealBridge to access the full analysis.
