ZELDA OVERHALL CUP

Monday, May 23

Mrs Zelda Overhall (now deceased) was appointed Patron of Central Coast Leagues Club Bridge Club when it was formed in August 1987. This was in recognition of Zelda's outstanding work in the promotion of bridge on the Central Coast. She had been instrumental in forming the Central Coast Bridge Club but was perhaps best known as a bridge teacher. A trophy, called the Patron's Cup, was introduced in 1991.

The event is now named after Zelda herself and has red points allocated. Because of her huge influence as a teacher on Central Coast bridge players, the event is for lower-ranked players.

The trophy is won by the best Bronze Regional (or below) pair

(Higher-ranked players can compete and earn points, but not the trophy.)

Players must be financial members of CCLCBC - there are 69 of these of eligible ranking. There is also a Special Prize for the best Silver Local (or below) pair for which 49 of the 69 are eligible.

Each player in a pair must be ranked Bronze Regional or below. If your ranking qualifies you to compete, then you need to play with another eligible player. Last year's winners were John Aldersley & Beryl Lowry and they are still eligible to compete again. Will you play and give them a run for their money?

A list of players of suitable rank can be found from next week at the club – displayed near the Director's table.

DON'T BE SHY – FIND A PARTNER AND HAVE A TRY

DEFENCE WITHOUT SIGNALS

In the ABF, February and April editions, Peter Hollands talks about how to defend when playing with strangers or online robots. He says that 'signals shouldn't be the be-all and en-all of how you defend'. 'A more important technique is to think about the inferences from the bidding, and the inferences from the play: what line of play is the declarer taking, and what line of defense is my partner taking.' An extract from each article follows.

Sitting South, we hold ♠643 ♥64 ♦ A853 ♣ AK62

Even though I'm passing a lot, I like to use this bidding time to try and work out what's going on. Already in this auction we know a lot of information, so don't just sit there and wait – when it gets to the play you're going to be rushed, so if you take the time when you're not actually doing much, you can work out a lot about the auction.

What do we know? East has 12-14 balanced and they have four diamonds. Even if they play better minor (opening 1♦ with three) after 1♦-1M-1NT that hand can no longer only have three diamonds. The only hand with three diamonds that would open 1♦ is the 4-4-3-2, and with that hand East would have supported the hearts immediately.

West's jump to 3 is an invitational hand with diamond support. East was happy to accept the invite, and showed three-card heart support along the way. West bid the heart game, rather than 3NT, so he presumably has a fifth heart.

What does partner hold? East and West have told us that they have a diamond fit, so my partner has only one diamond. If we can get off to a diamond lead, we should be able to give partner several diamond ruffs, using the *AK as entries. That looks like we're going to beat that a lot of tricks, so instead of just passing it out I would double. I'm hoping partner leads

their singleton, if they have one. If they don't have any diamonds, the double might be a bit dangerous, but then they might stumble upon a club lead and we will still beat 4Ψ .

Even though we are defending without signals, one assumed signal that lots of people play is that when you give them a ruff, it's suit preference (a low card asks for the return of the lower suit). Some people don't play that, but the vast majority do, so even if you don't discuss it, it's something you can assume. But don't be upset if partner doesn't follow your signal (the robots on BBO, for example, will not understand this signal).

Partner naturally leads their singleton, which you win and return a low diamond. Partner ruffs and obediently returns a club. You should win with the lower of your touching honours. When your ♣K wins, partner will know you have the ace. You give partner a second ruff, win the club return, and give a third ruff for three off.

It's important to think what was the lead from, and what can we deduce from it. Here, the ◆3 could be low from an honour, but partner doesn't have any honours (they wouldn't be leading low from an ace). It can't be top of a doubleton, so it must be a singleton, and we're lucky that we can get in quickly with the trump ace to give partner a diamond ruff. We'll lead the ◆2 to suggest a club return, so that we can deliver a second ruff —

the BBO robots will not recognise this suit preference signal, of course, but they might return a club anyway, as a spade return could cost a trick.

When partner leads something like a three, you may be able to rule out all other holdings and conclude that it's a singleton.
