

Marion is West and opens 2C; East (Mei-Hua) alerts and responds 2D; Marion bids 2S; Mei-Hua bids 4C (Gerber); Marion replies 4S (2 Aces); Mei-Hua goes 5C; Marion replies 5S (2 Kings) and Mei-Hua signs off in 6S. Marion thinks for a long time and bids 7S, which is passed out. Mei-Hua is not happy and tells Marion "I set the contract".

I am on lead and pluck out a safe ♥T. Marion thanks Mei-Hua for the beautiful dummy plays J, covered by Q and K. More thinking and Marion leads a small ♥, ruffed in dummy; small ♣ to the A and another small ♥, ruffed by the ♠A. Now she leads ◆A and discards ♠Q from hand and returns to hand with a trump, draws the last trump and claims. Marion is still shaking (like a leaf she says) but relieved it is over. She did have an extraordinary hand and her play cannot be faulted.

Jack Stocken discusses the freely bid 3NT: 1NT - 3NT with opposition passing. He says that if partner **doubles** this contract, it is an instruction to Lead a Heart and gives a great example of this in action.

*Editors Note:* I learned this convention from the late, great, Don Evans, but in reverse. Double meant <u>lead a spade</u>, otherwise always a heart - dummy has not sought a Major suit fit. Agree which version to use with your partner - you will come out ahead in the long run.

#### WHERE SHOULD WE BE IN FIVE YEARS?

The NSWBA will be conducting a strategic review of bridge in NSW - click on the link about half-way down the front page of their website for full details. The introduction says:

COVID -19 has affected many businesses in NSW adversely. The NSWBA and Affiliated Clubs are no exception. Bridge in NSW has lost clubs, playing venues and some 4,000 players over the past two years.

Overall, we are seeing a decline in table numbers and only a trickling influx of new and/or younger players.

Online bridge has given us new opportunities, but many miss the social aspects of their bridge get-togethers. Compared to pre-Covid times, large state-wide events are nowhere close to attracting the same number of players.

In the second phase of the review, all clubs and players will be asked to complete surveys. To help your thoughts when the time comes here are a few statistics from our own club, which reflect the comments above.

Membership has been falling for at least 11 years. Overall from 2012 to 2022 the fall is 259 to 146 = 43.6%.

Before the first Covid-19 lockdown, from March 2012 to March 2020, the fall was 259 to 196 = 24.3%. However, from March 2020 to March 2022, the fall has been 196 to 146 = 25.5%. So, the fall over the last 2 years is a little higher than that over the previous 9 years.

The number of our playing sessions has varied from 7 to 5 to 6 with the introduction of on-line bridge. Taking this into account, the percentage of our membership playing per session has been remarkably consistent at around 12%, except when we returned from the second lockdown. In order to increase table numbers, two sets of factors need to be addressed:

- 1. Those affecting general retention of membership and the attraction of new players we clearly have not been very successful in this regard over the last 11 years.
- 2. Those preventing people from returning to bridge (either F2F or Online) since the advent of Covid-19.

#### BRIDGE PODCAST: SORRY PARTNER

Bridge players and best friends, Catherine Harris and Jocelyn Startz, have launched a podcast talking about all things bridge. Each week they interview expert players from around the globe, discussing anything and everything from top tips to the funniest thing that's ever happened at a game.

#### **CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Every club is permitted to conduct **six** Championship events each year. The events must be chosen from a list specified in the ABF Masterpoint Manual.

These attract Green points, the same as our regular Duplicate games, but at a higher rate. Pairs are weighted x2 compared with x1.5 and Teams are weighted x1.5 compared to x1.

Our club runs three championship Pairs events - Open, Swiss, Graded (A and B) and three championship Teams events - Open, Restricted, Teams of 3. The latter was held in April; the second of the year is the (Open) Club Pairs to be held on Thursday June 30.

Another condition is that a minimum of 2 sessions must be held (up to a maximum of 10). This is why our Club Pairs is an all day event requiring pre-entry.

Our first Club Pairs was in 1987 won by Josie & Colin Mitchell. There has been a wide variety of winners since, then. The most prolific is Dorothy Berzins who has won a total of 6 times: with Adele Mills in 1988, 2014, 2015; with Peter Berzins in 1994, 2010 and with Di Coats in 2017. The event could not be conducted in 2020 and 2021 due to Covid-19 lockdowns, so the most recent winners were Hope Tomlinson and Barry Foster in 2019.

Entries are now open on the website: The cost of \$20, which includes a light lunch. Entries must close Thursday 23rd June at 12 noon.

#### THE ABF MASTERPOINT NEWSLETTER, MAY 2022

This gives a list of all clubs with any home club members as at 31st May 2022. Each has their home club members grouped into various masterpoint ranges, expressed as a percentage of their total home club members.

Nationally, including the ABF Youth Club there were 30,158 (down 1625 from last year) registered members. They fell into the following groups:

Hence you can compare this national average, which has changed very little over the last five years, against the breakdown for your club.

In our January Newsletter I produced similar figures, but in just three masterpoint groups: 0-100 (Novice), 100-300 (Restricted) and 300+. If you care to compare, the figures are almost identical to those above.

Looking at the National averages, our club has fewer beginning and novice players, the same in the 100-300 category and we are top-heavy in the 300+. Remember that these figures are based on Home Club members and do not necessarily reflect who is actually playing in club sessions.

#### MONTHLY SHIELD PROGRESS TOTALS

Counting the best 4 sessions only, the leaders are: Dorothy Berzins & Di Coats (88), Jan Clarke & Alan Bustany (76), Marion Ellis & Mei-Hua Crawford (68), Brian Warburton & John King (64).
