Did you know? To calculate the minimum number of rounds which must be played before being certain that two teams who have been continually winning will meet each other, the formula $Rounds = log_2(Number\ of\ teams) + 2$ (rounded up) is used. There were 16 teams, so the minimum number of rounds required was $log_2(16) + 2 = 6$. Teams actually played 7 rounds - thanks to John Lehane for his efficient organisation and directing.

Also helping to make the day a success were Pam Lumby, Carol Hamilton, Elaine MCGorm, Pam Harris, Gwen White and Barbara Grant who all brought something special to tempt your taste buds. Many thanks to these members and all others who helped in any way.

WHAT IS A DATUM?

In IMP (International Match Point) pair games, the average for a particular board is the arithmetical mean of all scores on that board. Usually the highest and lowest are excluded and the result is called the *datum*.

When the 'datums' are published, as in many congresses as well as some special club events - such as Swiss Pairs, you have the opportunity to see how your performance compared to the rest of the pairs.

The datum on each board is shown for North-South pairs. For a given board, subtract the datum from your score, if you were sitting N/S, or add the datum to your score, if you were sitting E/W. Then convert the net score (plus or minus) to IMPs using the conversion table on your score sheet.

INFRACTIONS AND IRREGULARITIES

It is assumed that no one intentionally breaks the rules. Bridge Laws are designed for the **rectification** of situations where non-offenders may otherwise be damaged and not as a **punishment** for the offenders.

For most common infractions the laws tend to be prescriptive, so they are easy for the Director to apply. In other cases, if the infraction has caused damage, the Director is to award an adjusted score. This involves judgement, so is harder than a simple mechanical ruling. The principle involved is to restore **equity.**

Penalties can be applied for breaches of procedure such as fouling of boards, ringing of mobile phones etc, but these are usually only applied after a warning.

VOLUNTEER WORK FOR BRIDGE PLAYERS

Are you interested in helping others? Do you have ten minutes to spare in the morning? Become a TELECROSS Red Cross volunteer. Red Cross helps hundreds of elderly or disabled people to stay at home by providing the reassurance of a daily telephone call to check that they are OK.

All you would need to do is undertake a 2 hour training session and then ring a nominated person (a different person each month) once in the morning between 0800 and 0900 hours. In the event that your person does not answer you would ring again in ten minutes time and if still no answer you would advise Red Cross. If for any reason you cannot ring on a particular day you simply advise Red Cross and they will take over for that day. The phone call is brief and does not involve a lengthy chat.

You can also nominate which month you are available and whether you are available Monday to Friday or 7 days per week or only Saturday and Sunday.

A police check is a Governmental requirement for all workers and volunteers, but Red Cross will organise this.

This is a great activity for Bridge players as it does not affect your playing opportunities and you are giving something to the community. Of course there are other volunteering activities available through Red Cross too and I have some brochures if you are interested.

The director ruled that the concession was cancelled.
