PERSONAL PROFILE: Margaret and Clyde Penfold

It is often said that partners in life should not play bridge together but if you have played against Clyde and Margaret you will know that they are exceptions to this rule.

Margaret's parents were married in the Embassy Chapel in Istanbul and she grew up in Turkey where her father was an accountant. Chess and backgammon were played, but she had no background in cards. Margaret was confirmed by the Archbishop of Istanbul – when she kissed his ring he said 'bravo'. This was the man who later became Pope John XXIII.

Schooled in England, Margaret loved sport, playing tennis and representative netball. She trained in London as a physiotherapist and after moving to Australia worked at a series of top Sydney hospitals and also had her own practice for a time. It was at a wedding in Sydney that Margaret met Clyde.

Clyde was named after his Scottish grandmother who was given the name of the ship *Clyde* on which she was born. He was born and educated in Orange where he remembers playing euchre, but no other card games. By the time he met Margaret he was an accountant/economist for CSR where he was employed most of his working life. Clyde's father was also an accountant!

Planning for an activity for their retirement, Margaret and Clyde saw bridge lessons advertised at Manly. They later attended some of Ron Klinger's classes, learning the rudiments of his 'Power' system. Otherwise they have developed their bridge playing together, with Clyde being the patient one according to Margaret. They regularly play twice a week because they love the challenge and mental stimulation of bridge, as well as the opportunity to meet people.
