# 2013 CLUB PROGRAM - JOIN IN THESE EVENTS!

## **SWITCHING SINGLES**

For 2013 we have introduced a new competition which we have called "Switching Singles". This is an **individual competition** which will be held on one Thursday each month from February to November. The specific dates are in the 2013 Programme.

To be part of the competition you will need to play on at least *five* occasions with a **different partner**. If you play with a regular partner and did not do so well on that occasion you can play with that partner again as long as you also play with *four* other partners during the competition. If you do play with someone more than once, only your best score with that person will count in the competition.

You can of course play in all ten sessions but remember only your five best scores will count and only with different partners. So the best plan is to try to play with ten different partners for the year.

The sessions will be scored in a similar way to the Monthly Medal so that you will be awarded points according to where you came in each session. Being an individual event, you and your partner will receive equal scores and will be treated separately.

Part of the fun will be lining up your partners for each month bearing in mind that everyone will be vying for a different partner for each month.

This is where your Programme will be useful as you can note in the back of the book (or in the programme each month) who will be your partner on that day.

We hope you enjoy this event as something a little bit different. As many of our members play with different partners on different days it should not be too difficult to line up a different partner each month.

Switching singles is an **Eclectic Event** which means that you do not have to play in every session to qualify – as long as you play in at least 5 sessions (and of course with different partners). Each session of an eclectic event earns green points at the usual rate. At the end of the competition you will earn additional masterpoints if you finish in the top half of the field.

As you can play in all ten sessions it could be a good opportunity to play with people you have not played with in the past. Good luck.

# **JUMPING JANUARY**

This 5-week event started on Thursday 3rd. This is another **Eclectic Event**. This time you need to play with the **same** partner for **at least two** out of the **five** Thursdays in January.

You are eligible for masterpoints each time you play, but your **best two** results will count towards outright awards (as above).

# **Arrangement of Tricks**

At the GNOT Finals in Coolangatta last month I was interested to hear that a declarer told an opponent he was not allowed to tell his partner that her card, played to the last trick, was "incorrectly pointed". The Director was not called by either player (see it even happens in the finals of national competitions!) and it was unclear what the outcome was!

# Law 65 – Arrangement of Tricks, paragraph B states that:

- 1. If the player's side has won the trick, the card is pointed lengthwise towards partner;
- 2. If the opponents have won the trick, the card is pointed lengthwise towards the opponents and
- 3. Declarer may require that, a card pointed incorrectly is pointed as above. Dummy or either defender may draw attention to a card pointed incorrectly, but for these players the right expires when a lead is made to the following trick. If done later Law 16B may apply.

So, as declarer you may call attention to any incorrectly pointed card at any time during the play of the hand and request that it be pointed correctly. As defender you may only 'call attention to' an incorrectly pointed card and only for the current trick.

### **GRAND SLAMS - IN SPADES!**

## 1. From Dorothy Berzins

Sometimes the system that you play will give a real advantage in the bidding. Sitting East West and playing Precision, Peter and I were the only pair to reach the optimum contract of 7♠ (Board 2, Mon, Nov 26)

I opened 1♣ (16+ any shape) holding

Peter responded 1♠ which showed 8 + points and 5 spades. I now bid 2♠ which in our system asks for controls in spades.

Peter showed 2 top controls ie the A & K of spades and I could now bid  $7 \clubsuit$ . Seven other pairs were in  $6 \spadesuit$  only.


With the void in the club suit most players were concerned that their partner may have held the Ace of clubs rather than the Ace of Trumps and so were not able to bid the Grand Slam.

Peter's hand was:

**♦** AK987 ♥ 10 ♦ 1032 **♣** KOJ8

No system is perfect, but Precision is excellent for finding out about the Trump holding.

### 2. From Colin Mitchell



'Twas the week before Christmas and MFP (unusually for her) missed a chance of glory. Sitting East I opened 1♣ and she replied 1♥. I rebid 2NT showing a balanced hand with 18 - 19 HCP. Then came 3♣ (Stayman), so I replied 3♠ showing a four card suit.

The bid of 4NT (RKCB) asked about my controls based on the spade suit and I replied  $5 \triangleq$  showing two aces and the  $\triangleq Q$ . This is where the chance for glory was missed with a pusillanimous bid of  $6 \triangleq$ !

Had she bid 5NT asking for kings she would have found that my hand held the **seasonal conformation of 'three Kings in the East'** and that 7. was a dead cert!

One pair bid the Grand, one other was in 64, and one in 6.

*Editor's note:* My excuse is that I was tired, but it makes a good story, even if we play *Puppet Stayman* and Colin's reply should have been 3♦!

#### PERSONAL PROFILE

## Toni Dixon

Toni was born in Casino and spent her childhood in a small town called Mallanganee which is about 25 miles from Tenterfield and 40 miles from Casino in northern NSW. Toni was the middle child of three children.

As Toni's parents ran the local general store (as well as training greyhounds), the kids had to make their own entertainment much of the time. Although Toni attended the tiny primary school at Mullanganee she had to go to Casino to attend High School. This involved an hour and a half bus ride each way. Toni recalls that the bus was nearly always late for school for one reason or another. It had to crawl up the Richmond Range (about 1324 feet) and was often affected by landslips after heavy rain.

Toni did not learn to play bridge until about 25 years ago. She was living in Carlingford and used to play golf with some friends, some of whom also played bridge. When she heard that others in her group had decided to take bridge lessons she eagerly joined in. Her teacher was Trish Turner of Epping.

When she moved to the Central Coast about 15 years ago Toni had a ready made group of bridge contacts on hand as her sister, Helen, had learned to play some time before Toni. It was at this time that Toni experienced her first Congress. As part of a women's team she went off to Foster, staying at the Navy Cottages. Helen organised the accommodation and was the first to utilise the Cottages (later called Foster Gardens) which became a popular watering hole for many Central Coast bridge players. Toni recalls that they used to have a lot of laughs, if not much bridge success, in those early days.

Toni has had a number of bridge partners with whom she played with much success for many years, including Masood (in Sydney mostly) and Jack Lindsay (at Brisbane Water and then at the CCLCBC).

Toni has also played very successfully with her sister Helen Gulliver. They have won many titles together and separately, and Toni (with 35 Club Championship and Red Point Event wins) is the fourth most prolific winner in the CCLCBC after Adele Mills, Nancye Joss and Peter Berzins.

Toni is the proud mother of two girls and Grandmother of three. Her daughters live in Ulladulla and Woolgoolga - it seems that the whole family like towns with somewhat unusual names.

Recent eye surgery has not impeded Toni's bridge expertise in the slightest!
